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Understand Our Tasting Notes

The core of Mosel Fine Wines is to publish independent tasting notes. The particularity of German wines made us adopt a specific structure in order to capture all the information needed for wine lovers to make informed choices based on our tasting notes which we explain below.

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This wine immediately stands out as the airy precision of its elegant nose of white peach, a hint of cassis, herbs and spices is simply mind-boggling. The wine then delivers a gorgeous array of orchard and delicately exotic fruits on the zesty palate and leaves one with an explosion of minerals and herbs in a hauntingly deep and elegant finish. This is an epic effort on par with the best at this Estate. 2025-2055

1. NOMENCLATURE: For simplicity, consistency, and clarity, we rely on the following to define a wine:

- We stick to the traditional "Village + Vineyard" denomination, even for wines from VDP classified vineyards (where only the vineyard name appears on the consumer side of the label).
- We provide the grape variety, except for the few cases of a blend, in which case the blend details will be given in the tasting note.
- No Prädikat in the name means that the wine was bottled as QbA.
- GG stands for "Grosses Gewächs" and EG for "Erstes Gewächs."

2. AP NUMBER: The AP Number is the unique number associated with any lot of German quality wine. We systematically provide this information (actually the last 4 or 5 "meaningful" digits of the AP) as wine growers sometimes differentiate between wines only through this AP Number. You can learn more about AP numbers [here](#). "N.A." means that the AP number was not yet available at the moment of publication and "(No AP)" means that the wine was not given an AP (because it is not bottled as QmP).

3. AUCTION: We add the mention "Auction" for wines sold via the annual Auctions held in September as they are different from the ones sold via traditional channels. You can learn more about the annual German wine Auctions and these particularly fine expressions of Riesling [here](#).

4. DRINKING WINDOW: Riesling has a long development cycle and can be enjoyable for 20 years and more. Like other great wines from this world, German Riesling usually goes through a muted phase before reaching maturity. At the end of each tasting note, we therefore provide a drinking window, which refers to our estimation of the maturity period for the wine. This maturity period is based on the following principles:

- It consists of the "fruit" and "terroir" phases as defined in our review of maturing Riesling.
- It does not explicitly mention the additional drinking window for fruity-styled wines which typically lasts for 1-3 years after the vintage.

5. SCORE: The use of scores to evaluate wines has advantages (clearly communicating a perspective) and disadvantages (over-simplifying such a complex matter as wine). We believe the advantages prevail as long as a rating is put into the perspective of a tasting note. Here our principles:

- Scale:** We rely on a 100-point scale with the following overall principles:

95-100	Classic: A true classic that sets the standards for its style and terroir. Only few wines make it into this "super-class" of Riesling and no stone should be left unturned to find them.
90-94	Outstanding: Stands out as distinctive example of its style and terroir. It will offer immense pleasure and should be actively looked out for.
85-89	Good to very good: Is a good to very good wine with special qualities. It will be delicious and is worthy of any cellar, especially if the price is right.
80-84	Solid to good: Is technically correctly made and will be enjoyable in its simple solid way. Price is the key driver for the decision to buy.
Below 80	Not worth it: Does not show any distinction and may even have some flaws. Given the currently still quite reasonable price level for Mosel Riesling, there is no reason to bother.

- Assessment:** We evaluate complexity, balance, and elegance ("more is not better") as well as respect of terroir and style (a great Kabinett will get a higher score than an average Spätlese). If the actual style does not match that on the label (say a Spätlese bottled as Kabinett), we will make a remark about its true style in the tasting note and [review the wine according to its actual style](#) (in the example as "the Spätlese it is").
- Timing:** Our ratings for young wines refer to the [expected quality of the wine at maturity](#) (i.e. during its drinking window) and not at moment of [tasting](#).
- Firm Scores vs. Score Ranges:** Bottled wines get firm scores. [Score ranges](#) indicate tasting notes based on cask samples.




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In Memoriam: Karl-Josef Christoffel (Weingut Jos. Christoffel jr.)



© Mosel Fine Wines – The Independent Review of Mosel Riesling ... and Beyond

March 2021 ended with sad news as Karl-Josef Christoffel (known as KaJo), the grower behind the Jos. Christoffel jr. Estate, has passed away.

Over the years, we had the honor of getting to know KaJo also "beyond the wine." He was smart, witty, and full of jokes and anecdotes about the past. He enjoyed walking in his vineyards, eating outside in Ürzig during sunset ... and water-skiing on the Mosel along its most beautiful vines and landscapes (he practiced this sport well into his 80s!).

He had the chance to have inherited top parcels in and around Ürzig in the 1950s, when he started working on the small family Estate in Ürzig straight after school, learned the trade "on the job" and produced wines like his family had been doing for decades.

We learned to appreciate the glorious wines produced by KaJo Christoffel (and his brother Kurt) in the 1990s. By the time we launched Mosel Fine Wines in 2008, the Estate was still essentially under the radar despite the fact that it was churning out some of the finest Riesling on earth. This led us to dedicate a full Issue on the Estate shortly after the launch, in May 2009. We remember his slightly amused but also honestly puzzled look: "Do you really think people will want to learn anything about me and how I make wine?" Thankfully, his reputation grew over the ensuing years and he could reap some of the benefits which came with it. But, in his heart, he always remained slightly puzzled about the fuzz.

The Mosel has not only lost another iconic winemaker, but also one of its nicest and kindest. Fortunately, his legacy in the form of his wines will live on in the cellars and on the tables of wine lovers around the world.

RIP KaJo and may you grace the heavens with such glorious Riesling!

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Latest Vintages: An Update on 2019 – 2012

Mosel Riesling does age beautifully well, but it does go through different phases, including "closed" / "muted" phases (see Mosel Fine Wines Issue No 27 from March 2015 for a detailed explanation). The profile and timing depend on the vintage. We therefore provide an annual update on how the different vintages from the last decade are developing based on our own experience over the past year.

2019	The finest 2019 wines continue to fire on all cylinders with their irresistible combination of elderflower, cassis, orchard fruits, and a hint of creamy ripeness. As expected, the wines are gradually developing a slightly fatter side but one which remains beautifully framed by the lively acidity. It is such a lovely vintage and we can understand anybody who just opens bottle after bottle. We expect that the dry and off-dry wines in particular will develop a harder side in a year or so. For the moment, one can still tank on bottled Mosel sunshine!
2018	The 2018 wines continue to show a little bit more cut than early on and the wines made from early harvested fruit are still quite irresistible at this stage. The wines made from fruit harvested late and with high sugar density continue to remain on the flabby and either cloying (if sweet) or feeling hot and slightly alcoholic (if dry-tasting). The finest wines are really made to age though.
2017	As we expected, the acidity packed in the 2017 wines has now led these wines to shut down, sometimes quite heavily so. Overall, the 2017s are still enjoyable thanks to their fruit / acid combination (including for the dry wines), but they no longer have their early shine and gloss. It is now best to leave one's finest bottles alone.
2016	After a phase of presence and precision early on, the 2016 wines have started to develop a slightly mellower side. Some continue to be utterly enjoyable, a trait shared with the 1997 vintage with which 2016 is often compared, yet many 2016 wines do not have their early shine. Much as 1997, the vintage is unlikely to become completely muted and hard, but we would now opt to leave the top wines alone for a while.
2015	Most 2015 wines are well and truly in their closed phase. The incredible depth of fruit makes the fruity-styled wines remain enjoyable, but they do not yet show any of the cut and finesse that will eventually prove their hallmark at maturity. The dry wines are not in a good spot, being disjointed, powerful, and not showing any of their early potential at this stage. We have an inkling that this great vintage will test our patience, like 1990 did.
2014	The early heterogeneity of the 2014 vintage is slowly fading away. Many wines are now giving the early signs of coming out of their shell again. The wines affected by gin, saffron, and mushroom flavors now start to lose their fruity opulence and a spicier side comes through. One can start to test the odd bottle, if curiosity urges one to do so.
2013	The fruity-styled 2013 wines are still quite hard and un-yielding, making the underlying acidity feel sharp and sometimes even out of balance. The better dry wines have come out of their early armor of smoke and tannins if any, but the acidity gives them an austere and sharp side. Also, the top botrytized wines are in a quite muted phase, even if they may prove quite enjoyable as the sweetness provides the right balance to the acidity. Overall, this is a vintage to still lay down and wait for.
2012	The 2012 wines have put on some flesh and go through a "fatter" phase (so no real "hard closed" phase), which is not unlike what the 2007 went through. However, the zestier acidity cuts through this "weight" and makes many of these wines already quite enjoyable today. In particular, the fruity Kabinett and Spätlese as well as the off-dry and dry wines can already offer much pleasure even if they will only show their finesse and elegance in a few more years.



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10-Years-After Retrospective: 2011 – The Vintage at a Glance

The Growing Conditions

The growing season proved an early one with a steady ripening during summer.

The spring was marked by an unusually warm and dry month of April which brought early bud break. A spell of frost in early May did quite some damage throughout Germany but spared mostly the Mosel. The early start in the season led to a record early flowering that occurred in many areas already at the end of May. In contrast, the summer proved rather average, but the grapes continued their steady ripening, generating hopes of a great vintage. A hailstorm at the end of August created some localized damage in the central part of the Middle Mosel.


The defining factor of the vintage was the warm autumn, which made sugar density levels soar and acidity levels plunge.

Sunshine combined with warm daytime temperatures and above all comparatively high nighttime temperatures in September made sugar levels surge and acidity levels plunge. The weather was dry but a few heavy showers led not only to an early outbreak of botrytis but also to some rot. The warm and dry weather continued until the end of the autumn, providing ideal harvesting conditions and ultimately limited the development of rot.

The harvest itself was then a rather easy affair and the free time allowed growers to go for botrytis selections.

Most Estates started their harvest in October, but some started much earlier, in an attempt to get better freshness. The harvest itself was easy and uneventful given the ideal weather conditions. The good conditions allowed many Estates to bring in some quantities of BA/TBA bottlings while others discarded this completely. A spell of frost even allowed to bring in some frozen grapes in January 2012 (but few of these wines were eventually bottled).

Evolution of Sugar Levels (° Oechsle) - 2011 vs Recent or Comparable Vintages (Bereich Trier)






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Evolution of Total Acidity Levels (g/l) - 2011 vs Recent or Comparable Vintages (Bereich Trier)

The Vintage Style

The 2011 wines proved soft and suave, in total contrast to the steely and racy 2010 vintage.

The 2011 wines were driven by ripe and creamy notes of fruits. Their lived from the charm of the immediate appeal. At the top, some stunning wines were possible if one managed to retain some freshness. The bulk of the harvest was however on the ripe side and shared a lot of similarities with 2007. 2011 delivered also one of the highest yields ever and this was reflected in the relative lightness and structure of the wines. Given the ripeness of the vintage, there was hardly any real Kabinett and Spätlese made, and the wines labelled as such were mainly produced from declassified Spätlese and even Auslese juice.

Their early appeal made for quite an immediate success with the public.


The round and easy nature of the 2011 wines made for immediate appeal and these were easy to enjoy and understand right out of the gate. After the searing and austere 2010 vintage, the public at large was finding much to like in the cuddly 2011 vintage. A large number of dry and off-dry wines were produced, something made easier thanks to the lower acidity. Also, these wines were also highly enjoyable from the start.

We urged readers to focus on the top dry and off-dry wines as well as on some of the earlier harvested ones in the fruity style.

The soft nature of the acidity made for ideal conditions for balanced and elegant dry wines. At the time, many of the leading Estates were still in the process of switching part of their portfolio from fruity-styled and sweet wines to dry ones. 2011 allowed them to produce some remarkable ones as long as they had a close eye on the sugar density and the resulting alcohol level in the wines.

We recommended however to look for alternatives to 2011 for some juicy Kabinett and Spätlese.

2011 was ripe and marked by high Oechsle degrees and this richness was all the more highlighted as the wines had lower acidity levels. It was clear from the onset that these were no conditions for producing the playful and animating Kabinett and Spätlese so prized by lovers of the genre. A few true Kabinett and Spätlese were eventually produced, especially from early-harvesting growers. But, overall, our advice to our readers at the time was to ask growers about any remaining stock of 2008 and 2004.



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10-Years-After Retrospective: 2011 Fruity / Sweet Wines Today – Suave Richness

2011 proves a vintage driven by aromatic and suave richness. Here the key facts.



2011 yielded luscious fruity-sweet wines which shine through aromatic precision and some baroque complexity.

2011 was a soft vintage and this showed through in our tastings: Most fruity and sweet wines were slightly round and had ample juicy and ripe fruits, often a hint of petrol, but also quite some charm. More honeyed flavors have come through now and these add to this feeling of richness. However, the wines are rarely cloying, probably a positive side effect of the somewhat higher yields and, this being Mosel, retain some verve.

Most 2011 fruity and sweet wines are now approaching maturity and shine through their fruity-waxy ripeness.

The aromatic balance of the 2011 wines immediately comes through upon opening. Only a few wines (often because of some residual reduction from the sulfuring) really need much patience for them to blossom in the glass. The wines still have some primary fruitiness but this is now blended with more secondary flavors including wax, herbs, and spices. Many of our favorites when tasted and reviewed at release, in particular Estates from the Saar, fared well and produced aromatic wines with quite some zest.

The sweet spot is clearly the noble-sweet wines, where a touch of botrytis adds verve to the underlying richness.

We were impressed by the 2011 noble-sweet wines already in 2012, but may even have sometimes slightly underestimated the potential. The vintage did produce more baroque-styled wines with lots of apricot, dried fruits, almond paste, and barbeque herbs. But, in this style, the vintage did deliver some great and age-worthy noble-sweet wines.

There is no real Kabinett and Spätlese in 2011, the finest wines bottled under such labels are "fruity Auslese" at best.

Our early assessment on Kabinett and Spätlese was largely confirmed. Except for a few wines (mostly from the Saar and Ruwer), wines bottled under the label Kabinett or Spätlese are all big Auslese. While some of them prove really enjoyable, one needs to keep this in mind before opening a bottle, as there is no true pure lightness and liveliness in these wines.

All in all, except for some amazing noble-sweet wines and some remarkable successes, notably in the Saar, 2011 is a vintage made for lovers of softer and rounder expression of the genre.

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10-Years-After Retrospective: 2011 Dry / Off-Dry Wines Today – Open and Inviting

We have reviewed a wide range of leading dry and off-dry Riesling wines from the 2011 vintage from Germany. If anything, it underlined the open and inviting nature of the vintage.



The 2011 dry and off-dry Riesling are all quite open, lusciously aromatic, and not without presence.

Our tastings showed that 2011 dry and off-dry wines are really open for business. The wines are inviting, packed with ripe flavors but not without aromatic purity. It is really hard to resist these wines. The low acidity makes some legally dry wines feel slightly off-dry and this needs to be taken into account when serving them. The ripeness of the grapes makes itself sometimes noticed through a touch of power in the finish. As usual, Riesling wines with 14% alcohol are bound to taste a touch hot in the finish. But even at lower levels of alcohol, quite some dry wines showed a phenolic, opulent, and baroque touch of power. Overall, expect for a few wines, 2011 is however not a vintage which we would keep eternally in our cellars and these wines are best enjoyed with some hearty food.

The 2011 vintage produced much inviting dry and off-dry Riesling but little truly extraordinary wines.

2011 yielded many wines with inviting and pleasing qualities. However, truth must be told, it yielded few truly remarkable wines, even at the hand of the most gifted growers. The ripeness, breadth, and aromatic presence all made for wines which do not have the spine found in the finest of vintages. Of course, there are exceptions and a few truly remarkable wines were made. In particular, Georg Breuer, Keller, and Emrich-Schönleber produced some modern-day classics. But these wines only represent a tiny fraction of the vintage.

Once more, the Mosel leveraged its cooler climate and graced wine lovers with some truly remarkable wines.

As in 2009, the Mosel yielded many great dry and dry-tasting wines which mingle with the finest from any part of Germany. In particular, Willi Schaefer produced a stunning GG (its only second after 2009). But also, Geltz-Zilliken, Heymann-Löwenstein, Immich-Batterieberg, and others produced deep and complex wines.

Overall, even if there are some notable exceptions (in particular from the Mosel), 2011 will not go down in history as one of the finest vintages for dry / off-dry Riesling. However, it is one which offers much immediate pleasure now.



Weingut A.J. Adam

(Neumagen-Dhron – Middle Mosel)

2011er	A.J. Adam	Dhroner Hofberg Riesling Kabinett	04 12	91
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The 2011er Hofberg Kabinett, as it is referred to on the consumer label, offers a delicately complex and elegant nose of bergamot, almond cream, yellow peach, coconut, a hint of butter, and white flowers. It is impressively rich and creamy on the palate, where creamy and juicy fruits paired with honeyed elements give it more than a hint of Spätlese if not Auslese. The wine leaves one with a mild feel of acidity in the satisfyingly playful but opulent and rich finish. Now-2031

2011er	A.J. Adam	Riesling Trocken	01 12	87
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The 2011er Riesling, as it is referred to on the consumer label (the term Trocken is left for the back label), offers fresh and zesty scents of grapefruit, candied lemon, and mint, as well as a hint of petrol, barbecue herbs, and pineapple. The wine proves quite lively and lean on the palate but develops more presence and even a touch opulence in the broader and slightly tart and phenolic finish. This dry wine needs some food to buffer off its remarkably forceful side. Drink up

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The 2011er Wallufer Walkenberg Riesling Spätlese Trocken Alte Reben proves light golden-colored and still rather reduced at first. It takes a while before revealing a quite complex and rich nose made of barbecue herbs (in particular rosemary and thyme), almond, canned yellow peach, mirabelle, greengage, a touch of licorice, and petrol. Licorice, ripe fruits, and a hint of toffee make for a creamy and intense experience on the palate. The wine leaves a sense of tannin and minty herbs in the fully dry finish. This dry Riesling may prove slightly more opulent and richer than the 12.5% of alcohol on the label would suggest, but makes up for it through presence and impact. Now-2031

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The 2011er Nonnenberg Monopol, as it is referred to on the consumer label, is a barely off-dry Riesling (with 10 g/l of residual sugar) made from the Estate's finest casks from this solely-owned vineyard. It offers a rather backward nose of smoke, roasted almond, and spices at first and it is only after several minutes that some racy elements made of bitter lemon, chalky minerals, barbecue herbs, pear, and vineyard peach emerge from the glass. The wine proves remarkably zesty on the actually dry-tasting palate. Here, elements of smoke, pear, and spices add a touch of depth. As the wine evolves, the feel in the finish becomes slightly ampler and almost imposing (despite the wine only having 11.5% of alcohol!). However, the feel of bergamot and tartness from bitter lemon makes for a ravishing aftertaste. As surprising as this may sound, this wine is still not ready and will need a few more years to fully reach maturity. But the potential is immense. 2026-2041

Where this wine really shines is on the palate which proves pure and refined despite quite some ripe flavors of exotic fruits (mango, pineapple, passion fruit, and apricot). A juicy and ripe sense of acidity runs through the wine and adds to its finesse and airiness. The finish is still pretty much on the sweet side, so further patience is needed (think ten rather than five more years). 20-Years-After Retrospective: 2001 – The Vintage at a Glance

The 2001 vintage is rather unique. It saw an unprecedented hype after being hailed as being the finest since 1971, if not 1959. This created a huge interest for German Riesling and many newcomers discovered the beautiful balance of these wines maybe for the first time. Some called it the birth moment for the renaissance of Riesling. We were already under the spell of the vintage when it hit the market in 2002. It proved also hugely impressive in 2011, when we retasted it in the context of our 10-Years-After retrospective (see Mosel Fine Wines Issue No 15 – April 2011). How does the vintage present itself today, 20 years on? The short answer is "beautifully well."

The Growing Conditions


The 2001 vintage did not benefit from any particularly favorable growing conditions, on the contrary.

The weather proved quite a mixed bag in 2001. Spring was slightly humid. This led bud break to "only" occur in line with long-term averages. The solid weather continued and flowering happened in mid-June without much trouble. The summer was hot and even scorching hot in August. This led to some localized water stress. All in all, everybody was happily looking forward to maybe not a great vintage, but at least a good one. But then some heavy rainfall hit the Mosel in September. It led to pockets of rot but, above all, brought cool weather which slowed down the ripening process of the grapes. Many winemakers we talked to at the time were getting very worried that another 2000 vintage was in store (in 2000, rain dashed the hopes of an otherwise very promising harvest). But, fortunately, the "2000 scenario" would not repeat itself.

What made 2001 a legend was one of those golden Octobers every German grower dreams of.

After all the rain and hardship in September, a miracle happened in October: The first true full-on golden October in nearly 20 years, with warm temperatures during the day, cool nights, and hardly any drop of rain. This good weather continued during the first part of November as well, and was only interrupted by some heavy rainfalls throughout the region on November 8. While the grapes were hardly ripe at the beginning of October, they now had the time to ripen evenly for up to a further 6 weeks. Unlike in 2000, the weather had remained cool in September. This meant that the grapes had not suffered so widely from rot as in the year before. Also, acidities were still frightfully high at the beginning of October yet gradually came down to more reasonable levels in the course of October and early November. Late harvesting Estates could not believe their luck and brought in some of their best fruit ever. However, things did not look as bright in the Saar and Ruwer valleys. Here, July proved a lot rainier than in the Middle Mosel and the ripening process never really recovered from the cold September, so that sugar density levels in the grapes remained on the shy side.

Evolution of Sugar Levels (° Oechsle) - 2001 vs Recent or Comparable Vintages (Bereich Trier)






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Evolution of Total Acidity Levels (g/l) - 2001 vs Recent or Comparable Vintages
(Bereich Trier)




The Vintage Style

The wines were characterized by a most enjoyable zest and aromatic intensity, also in botrytis selection bottlings.

Acidity levels were much higher than in other so-called "vintages of the century" (see the charts above) and also the Oechsle degrees remained most reasonable when compared with other "grand" vintages as 1990, 1988 or 1975, courtesy of the cool September in 2001. All this generated the most incredibly aromatic, complex, and zesty wines, which reminded many growers of the grand wines from 1990, 1975, or even 1971. The growing conditions also allowed winemakers to produce wonderfully elegant BA and TBA bottlings. Finally, a spell of frosty days just before Christmas rewarded the brave ones with some Eiswein.

The vintage favored the Mosel, and in particular the classical part of the Middle Mosel, which enjoyed one of its most highly praised vintages ever.

The firm but ripe acidity was perfectly balanced by good ripeness in the Middle Mosel and the combination proved a winner. A huge number of fresh and racy wines were made, which simply oozed some great *joie de vivre* in their youth. The wines from the Saar and the Ruwer proved much lighter and racier when young and did, overall, not reveal the same sensation of utter balance and depth.

20-Years-After Retrospective: 2001 Vintage – The Grandness of Riesling

We retasted 40 wines from leading growers over the past few months, and the conclusion is really simple: This is an epic vintage!



The 2001 wines are now all fully open and shine through their balance, depth, and precision.

Many wines from the 2001 vintage were still on the youthful and unevolved side when we tasted them in the context of our "10 Years-After" retrospective back in 2011 (see Mosel Fine Wines Issue No 15 – April 2011). This has now completely changed: All wines are now fully mature and shine like gold. In particular, the fruity-styled wines from the Mosel region are hugely complex and offer glorious and ravishing notes of beeswax, almond, fresh and ripe fruits, fine spices, whipped cream, and sometimes a touch of dried herbs. However, what really stands out is the absolute finesse and balance of these wines. They are full of ripe fruit, freshness, and energetic liveliness but also smooth and creamy presence with this yin and yang that Riesling can deliver so well.

The remarkable thing is that this beauty is expressed in all stylistic directions.

Often, the growing conditions are ideally suited for a particular style (say for instance dry wines or for Auslese), sometimes for two. However, 2001 manages the *tour de force* to have been suited for all stylistic directions. Some of the finest dry Riesling ever made come from 2001. Some of the fruity-styled Riesling as well. The same is true for noble-sweet wines.

The Mosel and Ruwer may have a slight edge over the Saar but, overall, the depth of quality is simply mesmerizing in 2001.

It is clear that the Mosel and the Ruwer produced some stunning wines. In particular, we had the change to retasted modern-day classics not only from Fritz Haag, Joh. Jos. Prüm, Max Ferd. Richter, and Karthäuserhof, but also from A.J. Adam (in one of his first vintages), Dr. Loosen, and Merkelbach. The Saar did also yield some stunning beauties (among others by Egon Müller) but the touch of additional acidity often adds an ever so slightly sharper touch to the experience. Finally, more than the highlights, what really stands out is the depth of quality in 2001. It is hard to find a less than exciting wine in 2001! As we reported a decade ago, 2001 was less of a success at Maximin Grünhaus, which was going through a slightly rougher period from 1999 until 2003.

In many ways, the 2001 reminds us now of the great 1971 and has plenty of life ahead.

The whole structure, the fruit quality, and airy precision of the wines now start to show more than an air of commonality with the great 1971 twenty years ago. In both vintages, there is zest but it is a ripe one. There is ripeness, but it is juicy one. There is almond but it is melted into beeswax. It is hard to do much better in this stylistic direct. We therefore also anticipate that the vintage will age beautifully well over the coming decades!



It then leaves one with a subtly zesty and beautifully saline feel in the dry finish. This breathtaking mature Riesling is all about elegance and balance. The sense of freshness is simply bewildering (and this despite a non-shy 13.5%, certainly by the standards of the period). We would not be surprised if this will continue to live up to its high standards for several decades. What a huge success! Now-2041 (Reprint Mosel Fine Wines Issue No 55 – January 2021)

However, the flavors are beautifully wrapped into a ripe touch of acidity which cuts through the sweetness in the finish. 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Perspective - 1921 and the Tale of Great Vintages

2021 marks the centenary of the mythical 1921 vintage, which is hailed as one of the greatest (if not the greatest) of the 20th century. This anniversary is the perfect occasion to dive into the marvelous world of great German vintages, how their greatness was universal in the past (because linked to sugar density), and how this universality has given way to a more differentiated approach in recent years, among others with the advent of climate change and a focus of shift towards dry Riesling.




GREAT VINTAGES | 1921 – A VINTAGE REVERED LIKE FEW OTHERS

Although 1921 is already 100 years ago, this vintage has remained burnt in the collective memory of Germany. The growing conditions were exceptional. Men were said to have drunk themselves to madness because they could not resist tasting and retasting this sweet nectar. It is a vintage which remains particularly close to the heart of Mosel growers as it yielded the first TBAs in the region.

1921 was one of those vintages which looked set on greatness right from the start. After some frosts in April cut down yields, the remainder of the growing season was marked by extremely high temperatures. May and June each only saw only one day of rain. Temperatures reached 30°C many times in July: There were no less than 23 summer days (with temperatures above 25°C), of which 15 were tropical (with temperatures above 30°C), with a record of 37.2°C hit on July 28. August proved very warm, but not as scorching hot as for instance 1911. There were 19 summer days, of which only 2 tropical ones. The draught was so severe that, as in 1911, the Mosel and the Saar hardly carried any water at all by September. The harvest started in many parts already on September 20. The heat carried on during the harvest (the October was characterized by a further 10 summer days). The early harvest was done in quite warm weather conditions and grapes sometimes started fermentation in the baskets. Rainfalls gave some outbreaks of botrytis.

As we already alluded to, this vintage saw the first TBAs made in the region, namely by the Wwe Dr. H. Thanisch Estate (Bernkasteler Doktor), von Schubert (Maximin-Grünhäuser Herrenberg), and by the Staatsdomäne in Trier (Serriger Vogelsang with a massive 290° Oechsle). The Joh. Jos. Prüm Estate did however not make anything above *feinste Auslese* because this was the first vintage of Sebastian Prüm-Erz. He had just taken over from his father who died suddenly in 1920, and he did not feel like capable of taking on such a challenge while getting to grips with the management of an Estate at the same time.



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The combination of levels of botrytis and comparatively low acidity led to many concerns at the time that these wines would not withhold the test of time. These concerns were proven baseless and the 1921 wines have been the highlight of many vinous evenings in the 20th century! We had the chance to taste a few of these rarities over the years and this unique combination of smooth almond complexity and low acidity is easily engraved in our memory.

GREAT VINTAGES | A LOOK AT PAST GLORIES

While 1921 was certainly THE overarching example of a glorious vintage, the Mosel was regularly rewarded by vintages which were hailed by growers, the press, or the public as being of extraordinary quality, and this since centuries.

While records are far and few for the pre-1800 period, clearly the **1779** vintage was mentioned as being exceptional in the 1800s. A Dutch Merchant is said to have paid the princely sum of 1,144 Fl. for a cask of Grünhäuser wine by the Abbey of St. Maximin (the Estate known today as Maximin Grünhaus).

In the 19th century, the first grand vintage seems was **1811** (also hailed in other parts of Germany and in Europe as "the vintage of the comet" in reference to the Halley comet which was visible that year. Th region had to wait another 20 years for a grand vintage, **1834**. However, this vintage proved so extraordinary that the price of Saar casks shot through the rook and were 10 times their normal one. This single vintage alone made so many Saar vineyards end up in a high taxation category in the classification of 1851.

It was not until **1857** and **1865** that the region benefitted again from exceptional growing conditions. This long period of almost 25 years was to be among the darkest hours of Mosel growers. Hunger and misery were omnipresent and profoundly marked a certain Karl Marx.




This was followed by **1884** which marked a renewed interest in Mosel wine. However, the trio **1892-1893-1895** really launched the Mosel on the international stage. Simply put, Mosel became all the rage in the high society around the world.

The start of 20th century graced the Mosel with exceptional vintages in short succession: **1904** and **1911** (with **1915** not far behind: it had been given the nickname of "debt repayer"). **1920** delivered some great wines with good acidity. Skipping **1921** over which already amply reported, the trio **1934, 1937** and **1938** produced some stunning wines but these vintages lacked the universal aura of 1921 to stick in the collective memory of the region.



After the war, **1945** was an incredible vintage ... but almost nothing was produced as the war was still raging on and people and equipment were scarce. The next great vintages would be **1949, 1953** (to a lesser extent than for instance in the Rheingau), and then **1959**. If you ask an older grower about great past vintages, 1959 will be high up his list.



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One has then to wait for **1971** and **1976** for growers and journalists to dust off the term "vintage of the century" in the Mosel. Somewhat surprisingly, the 1980s and 1990s, despite some glory, did not really mark the collective memory of the region. Ask a grower about the most memorable vintages in his living memory, chances are high that he will not mention any vintage from those two decades, maybe with the exception of the great 1990 despite these decades having yielded a gorgeous 1983, a superb trio 1988-1989-1990 and plenty of great vintages in the 1990s (as our "20 Years-After" retrospectives published over the years have shown). We will come back to this apparent contradiction later in this article.

GREAT VINTAGES | HISTORICALLY LINKED TO HIGH SUGAR DENSITY

What do all the vintages that we casually listed in the previous section have in common? It is pretty simple: unusually high sugar density levels and, possibly, some outbreak of botrytis (this concerns in particular 1904, 1921, 1949, and 1976).

The reason for this is the geographical position of the Mosel at the northern limit of ripeness. Only the finest terroirs, exposed fully south facing, on steep slopes, and with ideally sun exposure were deemed suitable for winemaking. Up to the 1980s, even these terroirs would only generate one great vintage per decade (three others would be average and six unripe).

Sugar density in the grapes was the single most important indicator of quality. Such vintages yielded wines with more body and riper acidity. Mosel wine back then could be thin and acidic, so these were critical characteristics which immediately reflected in the price achieved by not only the top Estates but also across the board. More often than not, they also yielded luscious, high-end Auslese, Beerenauslese, and Trockenbeerenauslese. These wines shared three characteristics: (a) They tasted divine (b) they were rare and (c) they were long-lived. Families would keep bottles for grand occasions, sometimes decades later, and thereby keep the flame and vivid memory to the vintage alive long after the dry and off-dry wines were drunk up.

This explains why the great vintages of the past were almost always rather universal and hence their aura resonated so much.

GREAT VINTAGES | A LINK NO LONGER SO CLEAR IN THE 21ST CENTURY

The notion of glorious vintages has however evolved since the beginning of the 21st century out of two dynamics.

Climate change: "There has not been a single bad vintage since the 1990s" is a sentence we often hear and there is some truth in it. Reaching physiological maturity has gradually disappeared from the list of worries of Mosel growers. On the contrary, as we explained among others in our article on the climate change (Mosel Fine Wines Issue No 28, Jun 2015) and in our article on Kabinett (Mosel Fine Wines Issue No 55, Jan 2021), taming the ripeness process of the grapes is now a central issue to produce great Riesling.

This is why, if one asks wine lovers to list their "great German vintages," chances are high that 2001, 2004, 2008, 2012 will fall. With the exception of 2001, none of these vintages are stunning vintages for noble-sweet wines. But they are admirable vintages for dry German Riesling and fruity-styled Riesling.

A shift in taste: While grand sweet wines still remain awe-inspiring, there has been a definite shift of interest towards other expressions of Riesling. Many wine lovers now see great dry / dry-tasting Riesling as the defining factor for a vintage's quality. Others only swear by light-footed fruity-styled Riesling (be them labelled as Kabinett or Spätlese). These expressions of Riesling not only age extremely well, they bonify with age. 30-year-old dry Riesling by leading producers are now on par with the quality of grand white Burgundy wines. Fruity-styled Riesling from the 1980s and 1990s are still alive and kicking.

This shift explains, among others, why the 1990s seemed to have fallen between the cracks of the collective "great vintages" memory. Yet, if you ask us, the greatest period for fruity-styled wines in the Mosel are the 1990s, certainly now. 1990, 1993, and 1997 are possibly the greatest vintages ever for this unique expression of Riesling. But the Mosel (and Germany in general) were not yet famed for their dry and fruity-styled Riesling at the time and, except for 1990 or 1994, none of the vintages from the 1990s yielded large quantities of BA and TBA.

It remains fascinating to see how the Mosel and Germany as a whole have shifted gear in what is regarded as a "grand vintage." The days of the "universal grand vintages" may be over, but there are still plenty of great vintages ahead!
